

# Celebrating St. Patrick in the South Bay

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"If the cold rain continues," says Chris Benson of C.B. Hannegan's Restaurant and Pub in Los Gatos on a recent wet day, "we'll just turn the hail into green gold nuggets for St. Patrick's Day."

Such theatrics might well go unnoticed given the other festivities Benson and his colleagues have planned for Friday. In addition to the full oyster bar, spit-roasted pig, corned beef and cabbage, and shepherd's pie, locals will enjoy entertainment by the drum and bagpipe corps Hannegan's Home Boys as well as the CruiseTones, who've been playing the party for 25 years.

There will even be a kilt fashion show for those with runway aspirations. For the third year in a row, the city of Los Gatos will shut down Bachman Avenue to accommodate revelers, but Benson warns that those seeking green beer won't find it here.

"People like to come and embrace the day with friends and family," he says. "We're all about good clean fun."

While festivities across the South Bay abound on St. Patrick's Day, those not of Irish lin-

eage might be surprised to learn that the often raucous holiday has religious roots. In fact, according to Liz Linehan, who moved from Dublin to Los Gatos in 1998, Irish children wear fresh shamrocks throughout the day as a symbol of the Holy Trinity, not simply because they're green. Unlike here, Irish schoolchildren aren't preoccupied with leprechauns, and most families will spend March 17 feasting on something other than corned beef and cabbage. One thing that's the same in both countries: an extended visit to a local pub.
